Gentlemen, I Give You The Scouts!


Excerpts from a speech of Col. Nicoll F. Galbraith to the Winter Night Club, Colorado Springs, CO on November 15, 1945

Gentlemen, I give you the Scouts, the Philippine Scouts! Of their loyalty and professional ability, I cannot speak too highly. As you know, they were our Regular Army, though native troops. We had one division on Luzon and two regiments on Corregidor, a total of 12,000.

Based on my experience, I feel safe in stating that when properly disciplined, trained, and led, they have few military superiors. When their record is written, it will be a worthy addition to American history.

The day following the capitulation, the Commanding General and his staff were taken to Manila to be held there as hostages until certain requirements had been fulfilled. At that time, all the troops and the many civilian employees had been assembled in the open and were living scattered among the debris. The General and I walked side by side at the head of our little column as we left the west exit of Malinta Tunnel. There was no announcement, no fanfare. But someone saw and recognized that man with a heavy heart. Almost simultaneously, as if by prearranged signal, officers and men, scattered as they were throughout that devastated acreage, rose to their feet and with a salute paid silent tribute.

One seldom witnesses in real life such touching and beautiful drama. Whatever his nation might feel about him, at least his troops to a man were behind him.

Gala International Event Planned For Centennial

The Philippine Scouts will be celebrating their 100th birthday this year. The Scouts were established by Act of the United States Congress on October 8, 1901. President Joe Aquino has appointed a rather large ad hoc committee to begin preliminary planning for a centennial celebration. Chairman and vice-chairman of the committee are Nicoll Galbraith and David Rosen respectively.

A meeting was held in San Francisco on January 20, 2001, with Senator John Patterson attending from Rhode Island. Preliminary plans are for a one day affair, Saturday, October 6, 2001 (to avoid conflict with Columbus Day), at the Presidio, in San Francisco, hosted by the Golden Gate Bay Area Chapter. Plans for ceremonies and VIP guests are evolving. An evening banquet will be held at the

Fort Mason Officers Club. This will be an elegant affair, consistent with the historic deeds of the Scouts.

A subsequent meeting was recently held in San Francisco with Senator Dianne Feinstein's staff and the Philippine Consulate to discuss the possibilities of high-level government representation from both countries. The ultimate goals of this event are to: 1) honor and commemorate the heroic deeds of the Philippine Scouts, 2) educate the public about the critical role the Scouts played in WWII, and 3) generate increased interest and membership in the Philippine Scouts Heritage Society. Further notice will be forthcoming as details emerge.

Gen. John J. Pershing Chapter Report El Paso, TX Jan. - Sept. 2000

The chapter participated in an annual installation dinner for the local chapter of the Ex-POWs. Mr. Parazo, Past TX State Commander, had the honor of officially installing the new officers. A certificate of appreciation was presented to Mr. Parazo.

The Veterans of Foreign Wars invited members of the chapter to join in their annual Loyalty Day Parade. Dignitaries from the military and civilian community also participated.

The chapter was invited to an annual Flag Ceremony sponsored by the Military Order of the World Wars. There were about 45 civilian and military organizations that attended with their flag and colors.

The Ex-POW local chapter in El Paso commemorated the Fall of Bataan at the Fort Bliss National Cemetery. A few survivors of Bataan and Corregidor attended the celebration. Guest speaker was the director of the local VA.

On April 16, the commemoration of the 58th Anniversary of the Bataan Death March was held at the White Sands Army Missile Range in New Mexico. About 3,000 marchers participated. Military participants from England, Germany, Canada, the

Philippines, and from 35 states in the U.S. were among those who braved the 26.2-mile distance. Hundreds of civilians, young and old, boy and girl scouts, high school and college students also were in the march. The Ex-POWs and their families were treated with an early special breakfast. The march started at the firing of a cannon after a brief opening ceremony held at about 0645 hours. TV reporters interviewed Mr. Parazo about his experiences as a POW. A special program and awards ceremony was held at the conclusion of the march.

Mr. and Mrs. Parazo were special guests at a Junior Navy ROTC dinner and awards ceremony held at a local high school. Mr. Parazo was a featured speaker. He was also the presenter of a few awards and certificates from the Military Order of the World Wars and a certificate from the Philippine Scouts Heritage Society Chapter. Mr. Parazo is an active member of the Military Order of the World Wars.

Four high school students from different states interviewed Mr. Parazo for their history projects. They chose the Philippines during WWII and the Bataan Death March. This was their first time to hear about the Philippine Scouts. They were very glad to share some of the veterans and POW experiences during that period.

El Paso Chapter members who attended the 2000 Annual Reunion held in San Mateo, CA are Col. and Mrs. John Olson of San Antonio, William and Charito Cazar of Hawaii, and Mr. Parazo.

Veterans, POWs, family, friends, and soldiers came together in August as Fort Bliss paid tribute to a leader from both world wars by dedicating Sage Hall. This was in honor of MG Charles G. Sage, former commander of the 200th Coast Artillery Regiment, National Guard, who later led an anti-aircraft unit in the defense of Manila, Bataan, and Corregidor during WWII. Units of the regiment were camped east, next to the 26th Cavalry when they arrived at Fort Stotsenburg in Sep/Oct, 1941.

The Philippine Defense and Liberation Ribbons

Our Legal Advisor, Col. Melvin H. Rosen, noticed in the last issue of this newsletter that the Philippine Defense Ribbon and the Philippine Liberation Ribbon were both displayed improperly in the nameplate design. Despite the way it is worn on General Wainwright's uniform in the accompanying photo, the preponderance of evidence shows that the Philippine Defense Ribbon should have two stars below and one star above. Col. Rosen also pointed out that the Philippine Liberation Ribbon should have the white stripe on the right side. As you'll see, these have been fixed in the newsletter design. 

From The Historian's Corner By Col. John E. Olson, National Historian

Philippine Scouts Heritage Society Honors POW Comrades Who Died In Camp O'Donnell

The members of the Philippine Scouts Heritage Society (PSHS) are planning to place a plaque at the site of the Japanese POW enclosure known as Camp O'Donnell in the Philippines to honor their comrades who died of starvation and disease in the prison in 1942.

The Philippine Scouts were formed in 1901 by Act of the United States Congress to assist in the pacification of the islands of the Philippines, following the departure of Spanish troops in 1899. Following WWI, 6,000 of the Philippine Scouts were inducted into the Regular Army of the United States. In response to the growing expansion of the Japanese Empire during the 1930s, the U.S. Congress increased the Philippine Scouts' strength to 12,000 in the spring of 1941.

When the Japanese invaded the archipelago in December 1941, the Philippine Scouts, although outnumbered, stubbornly opposed the enemy, thus permitting the United States Army Forces in the Far East (USAFFE) to withdraw to the Bataan Peninsula. From this strategic point, the Scouts could prevent the Japanese from utilizing Manila Bay to support their drive south.

For over three months, the Philippine Scouts stopped enemy attempts to push into Bataan; destroyed several landings; and crushed three penetrations of the USAFFE lines. Debilitated by disease, starvation, and lack of ammunition, the Scouts were striving to halt the overwhelming numbers attacking them, when they were ordered to put down their arms by higher headquarters.

In the ensuing three weeks, the exhausted survivors were forced to march north over sunbaked roads with virtually no food and insufficient water to Camp O'Donnell. Many who were too weak to walk were brutally shot or bayoneted. The survivors of the Death March were herded into the Camp. The Japanese failed to provide sufficient food or medicine and refused to let the International Red Cross and other relief organizations render aid.

From late April until the end of June the deaths increased in staggering numbers. Finally, when the story of the extermination of captives became known, the Japanese High Command began gradually to release the Philippine Scouts and their Philippine Army comrades. But by the time the last Philippine Scout staggered out the camp gate, over 2,600 had been buried.

The unveiling and dedication ceremony will take place on April 9, 2001 at Camp O'Donnell, on the Philippine side. All former Scouts, family members, and friends are cordially invited to attend. The plaque bears silent honor to the heroes who paid the supreme sacrifice for their country. May they never be forgotten!
